Welcome (40 Minutes)

Be intentional to have authentic relationships...

Worship (5 Minutes)

As you fellowship with one another, please be intentional about sharing what the Lord is doing in your lives. Get to know one another and encourage one another. Are your conversations pointing one another toward Christ?

Word (45 Minutes)

Joshua 4:1-24

The author in this chapter stresses on the remembrance of God's goodness and focuses on the twelve stones and their significance. Getting through the river was not the end of it all. They must remember what happened there.

Joshua says, you must remember what God has done; and these stones are to serve as visual aids. Israel is not to only remember for themselves but to teach their children to remember (4:7, 21-24) as well. The stones were meant to provide occasions for teaching, for impressing up the next generation God's mighty work. The stones show us God's method of retaining his people's faith is not by frequent and dazzling displays of power but by faithful witness and teaching of those particular acts in which he had already demonstrated his care for his own. This makes us assume that a great enemy to our faith is forgetfulness (Deut. 8). A real threat of simply slowly forgetting the goodness of God. How quick are you to forget? Do you have spiritual amnesia?

We see reminders throughout the bible of God's acts in which he demonstrated his care for his people (this is not an exhaustive list). As God commanded Moses to lead his people out of Egypt, he gave him instructions for how this redemption was to be remembered in the Passover meal (Ex. 12). Here in Joshua, 12 stones will help them tell their story. Today, for Christians, Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper to represent his body and blood, saying **"Do this in remembrance of me"** (Luke 22:19; 1 Cor. 11:25-26). Likewise, baptism pictures our union with Christ in his death, burial, and resurrection (Rom. 6:3-4). **The Lord knows our need, our forgetfulness, and has graciously given us these symbols to remind us of our redemption in Jesus Christ.** We must tell of his faithfulness so all can have clear proof of his might, so they might remain faithful in their lives.

Discussion

- 1. Chapter 4 begins when "all the nation had finished passing over the Jordan," yet the Lord still holds back the water for a time. In fact, all of chapter 4 takes place at the riverbank. There the Lord gives instructions for a memorial, one each for two different groups. Who are these two groups, and what is the Lord's purpose for each?
- 2. What is the significance of the 12 stones plucked from the Jordan River?
- 3. What does the provision of this memorial tell us about God? What does the need for this memorial reveal about human nature?
- 4. In 4:14 we hear an echo from a verse in chapter 3. What verse is it? What does the repetition of this statement tell us about how God chooses to bring salvation?
- 5. Remember God's goodness in your life. What are some "wonders" the Lord has performed in your life you need to continue to remember?
- 6. As Christians today, what are two ordinances Jesus instituted for us to remember our redemption? (See 1 Cor. 11:25-26; Rom. 6:3-4)
- Israel must not only remember for themselves but teach their children to remember (4:7, 21-24). Do you share what these ordinances mean? Do you share what Lord has done in your life? With your kids, family, friends, or others? Why or why not?

Note: This weeks questions are based upon questions in the Book entitled "Joshua" by Trent Hunter (available in the NFCC bookstore, at Lifeway Bookstore, or online.)

Walk (30 minutes)

After enjoying fellowship, worship, and time in God's word together, it is now time to pray together as a group and encourage one another in the faith. It is very easy for this portion of the group time to be consumed by the other portions. However, this segment of the group time is crucially important. It answers the question, how do we apply what we are learning in Joshua to our lives today?

Many groups have found that it is helpful to sometimes break up into a men's group and a women's group for the purpose of being able to be more transparent and honest as we encourage one another and keep one another accountable. I encourage you to try this in your groups.

In addition to praying for, and encouraging, one another, this portion of the group time should also be used for planning how your group can participate in God's work outside the walls of our church – "neighbors and nations." Discuss with your group some ideas on how you can be intentional with building relationships with your neighbors and co-workers. What can your Community Group do to impact the area around you?
